13.2 The Secretary General shall present to the Executive Council biannual financial reports on the APA financial situation.

ARTICLE -14

The Secretary General is authorized to write-off on losses of cash, stores and other assets up to limit of 1000 Euro and anything above this amount has to be approved by the Executive Council. A full statement of all such amounts written off shall be attached to the annual financial report.

ARTICLE -15

The APA funds shall be made up of:

- Payment of assessed contributions by Member Parliaments in accordance with approved attachment.
- 2- The grants, endowments and donations in cash and in kind accepted by the Secretary General.
- 3- The Interests/profit granted on funds and deposits of the APA accounts.

11 **ARTICLE -16**

16.1 Upon the suggestion of Secretary General the Executive Council shall determine the fees of an External Account Auditor who shall be a certified accountant of the host country, locally appointed on a yearly basis by the Secretary General.

16.2 The local External Account Auditor shall present his/her report before the end of the fourth month of the next year to the Secretary General who shall submit it with his/her comments and views to the Financial Control Committee (FCC), as defined by the paragraph 16.3 below, as well as to the Executive Council for consideration and approval.

16.3 A Financial Control Committee (FCC) composed of three Auditors shall be appointed by the Executive Council on a two-year rotational basis to be nominated by Member Parliaments from among those regularly contributing to the APA budget.

16.4 The Financial Control Committee (FCC) shall meet annually at the Headquarters of the Secretariat in order to audit the accounts of the

- 16.6 In no case, however, shall the Financial Control Committee include substantial observations in its audit report without first affording the Secretary General or his/her representative(s) an opportunity for explanations to the FCC on the matter under observation. Such explanations shall be included in the report of the Committee.
- 16.7 The Secretary General may submit to the Executive Council a report giving his/her views and observations on the Report of the Financial Control Committee (FCC) and that of the local External Auditor.
- 16.8 The Secretary General shall pay the fees of the local External Account Auditor, while the fees and other expenses of the Financial Control Committee (FCC) shall be borne by their respective Parliaments.
- 16.9 No former staff member of the Secretariat shall be appointed as Auditor. Likewise, no former Auditor shall be appointed in the Secretariat before a period of three years has elapsed since he/she left his/her last position.

ARTICLE -17

The Executive Council shall examine the reports of the Financial Control Committee (FCC), of the local External Auditor and of the Secretary General. Approval of the Report of the Financial Control Committee (FCC) by the Executive Council shall authorize the closing of the accounts of the concerned fiscal year and clearing the Secretary General's financial responsibility thereon. Otherwise, the Executive Council shall continue to investigate the remaining questions and find resolution before the end of the next fiscal year.

Preamble

Convinced that the pursuit of peace based upon justice and international cooperation is vital for the preservation of human society and civilization:

Reaffirming the devotion of Asian countries to the spiritual and moral values which are the common heritage of their peoples and the true source of individual freedom, political liberty and the rule of law, principles which form the basis of all genuine democracy:

Believing that, for the maintenance and further realization of these ideals and in the interests of economic and social progress, there is a need for a closer unity among Asian Countries:

Responding to this need and the expressed aspirations of their peoples in this regard, it is necessary forthwith to create an Assembly which will bring together Asian countries into closer association with a view to their eventual integration into an Asian parliamentary union;

We, therefore, the present members of the Association of Asian Parliaments for Peace (AAPP), see the need for the transformation of AAPP to Asian Parliamentary Assembly (APA) and do herebydeclare, on behalf of parliaments we represent, the following:

General Rules

Article 1: Establishment of APA

The Association of Asian Parliaments for Peace (AAPP) is hereby transformed into the Asian Parliamentary Assembly (APA), hereafter called "the Assembly". The Charter of the AAPP is accordingly replaced by this Charter.

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SECTION IV "On the Executive Council"

This set of amendments contains proposals to regulate the activities of the Executive Council in more detail. The Executive Council is the most important body of the APA, however, in the current Rules of Procedure only one Rule concerns its activities. It is proposed to introduce a separate chapter in the Rules of Procedure that sets down the procedure for the establishment and operation of the Executive Council. According to te current practice, the Executive Council meets twice a year, one of its meetings is held immediately before the session, and the other meeting is held approximately three months before the Plenary session.

Holding a separate meeting of the Executive Council three months before the Plenary session entails an additional financial burden of arliament of the presiding over country as well as on parliamentary delegations of the participating countries. Also the parliamentarians have		

find additional time during the busy period of parliamentary activities. Not all parliamentarians have the opportunity to participate in this Committee meeting.

The analysis of the practice of holding meetings of the Executive Council reveals that the agendas of the two Executive Council meetings are similar, debates are conducted on the same issues and at the second meeting of the Executive Council there are presented the arguments that have been already presented at the first.

It is proposed that the Executive Council should meet **twice a year** immediately before and after the Plenary session, which will reduce the expenses of the host party and the time the delegates spend traveling.

The first meeting of the Executive Council before of the Plenary session is a "summarizer". At this meeting there is presented the annual report of the Secretary-General on the work of the APA and reports on activities of the Committees, considered the resolutions prepared by them, made a decision on recommending these resolutions for approval by the Plenary session or returning them to the Committees for revision, finalized the agenda of the Plenary session, determined its rules of procedure, presented the annual report of the Secretary-General on budget utilization and made a decision on approval or disapproval of this report.

The second meeting of the Executive Council is a "planner". It determines the APA work plan for the next year and the preliminary agenda for the next Plenary session based on proposals of the delegations; in accordance with this agenda there is determined the agenda of the committees and subsidiary bodies and approved the budget for next year based on the proposal of the Secretary-General.

Please note that it is the Executive Council that must make a decision on the final approval of the budget. It is not practical to consider and approve the APA budget at the Plenary session.

SECTION V "On the General Assembly"

The procedure for conducting General Assembly in the current Rules of Procedure is regulated by separate rules, which complicates their application in practice.

It is proposed to combine the rules regulating them in a separate chapter "General Assembly", including clarification of some aspects of organizing and conducting General Assembly.

The essential proposal is dissolution of the Bureau as an APA body as this body has never worked in practice.

In addition, it is proposed to delete the concept of an "additional item" and leave only an "emergency item". The authors of the amendments proceed from the fact that the **General Assembly** should consider the pre-planned items that were elaborated in the committees and approved by the Executive Council. Outside of this procedure, an item can be included in the **General Assembly** agenda only if a really extraordinary event occurred in some country or in the world. In this case, an emergency item may be considered. Consideration of "additional items" opens up the possibility for including in the **General Assembly** agenda of the items that were not previously approved by the committees, which creates the risk of taking unprepared decisions.

SECTION VII "ON THE APA DECISION-MAKING PROCEDURE"

This set of amendments is of fundamental importance. Unfortunately, there were situations when amendments proposed by a country were not considered due to an unclear procedure for proposing resolutions and amendments to them. In particular, at the Executive Council meetings amendments proposed by some countries are considered under the pretext that they are "technical" and other amendments are not considered because they are "substantive". But which of them are technical and which are substantive is determined by a representative of the Secretariat. This infringes the rights of the delegations. We agree that the amendments, both substantive and technical, should be considered by the standing committees. In order to avoid manipulation, no amendments at all should be considered at the Executive Council meetings since within the Rules of Procedure it is impossible to define clear criteria for distinguishing between "technical" and "substantive" amendments.

The Executive Council should either approve the resolution as a whole and recommend it for inclusion in the Plenary agenda or send it to the standing committee for revision. In addition to the resolution, the APA Plenary may adopt a declaration. It is proposed to regulate the procedure for the adoption.
