8. Meeting of the Standing Committees

Parallel to the general debates in the Plenary Hall, the meeting of four Standing Committees were held to consider and approve the relevant documents on their agenda.

9. Meeting of the Drafting Committee on Declaration

An open-ended drafting committee on Baku Declaration was held. The interested delegations participated and reviewed the draft text offered by host country Azerbaijan. After an extensive exchange of views, the Baku Declaration was adopted. ([Attachment VII](#)).

1. The delegation of Parliament of the Islamic Republic of Iran, registered its reservation by stating that: “Documents adopted by the current meeting on Palestine should not explicitly or implicitly be construed in any way as recognition of the Israeli Zionist Regime.” The delegation of the Parliament of the Islamic Republic of Iran expressed its reservation regarding paragraph 9 of the Baku Declaration and emphasized that the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) should be

achieved in accordance with the national laws of the Member Parliaments.

2. The following statement was received by the APA Secretariat from Parliamentary delegation of Russian Federation: *"During the discussions at the Drafting Committee the delegation of the Russian Federation has requested to amend one of the paragraphs of the Baku Declaration with a view to exclude bilateral contentious issues from the text in accordance with the Rule 21 of the APA Rules of Procedure. This request was disregarded by the Chair. The Russian delegation has stressed that points which don't enjoy consensus should be amended or deleted.*

Although the meeting of the Drafting Committee on Declaration was concluded, debates over the specific paragraph of the declaration between concerned delegations continued on the initiative of the Chair. Despite the arguments of the Russian delegation the text remained unchanged.

Due to the lack of consensus, the delegation of the Russian Federation informed the APA Secretary General in a written form of its views and requested the Secretariat to draw the APA Parliaments' attention to this matter". ([Attachment VIII](#))

Our country singlehandedly implemented all these norms, principles and resolutions by liberating its territories, restoring its territorial integrity and sovereignty. So, we are well aware of the urgency of this matter.

DURING THE OPENING SESSION OF
THE 15TH APA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Honorable President of the Milli Mejlis of Azerbaijan,
Distinguished Representatives of APA Member Countries,
Mr. Secretary General,
Dear Participants,

I am very pleased to meet you in the heart of Eurasia, at the western tip of Asia, on the coast of the beautiful Caspian Sea, on the territory of Azerbaijan. Baku is a highly important center for Asia, for the Caucasus and the Caspian basin. We are very pleased to hold the 15th Plenary Session of the Parliamentary Assembly of Asia in Baku, the city of success and development of the 21st century. I would like to convey to you the heartfelt greetings of the Turkish people and H.E. Mr. Numan KURTULMUŞ, Speaker of Grand National Assembly of Türkiye.

We would like to express our sincere gratitude to the Milli Mejlis which is the heart of Azerbaijani people and its Speaker H.E. Mrs. Sahibe GAFAROVA for the extraordinary hospitality.

Azerbaijan is a quite significant center for regional stability. The liberation of Azerbaijani territories from nearly 30 years of unjust occupation and ensuring of Azerbaijan's territorial integrity is a very crucial step not only for Azerbaijan but also for the region. Reconstruction activities in the liberated territories of Azerbaijan have made great progress. Bringing the peace talks between Azerbaijan and Armenia to a fair and lasting conclusion will enhance stability and prosperity not only for two countries but also for the whole region. Türkiye has always stood by Azerbaijan and will continue to do so.

Asia is home to a rich cultural diversity from west to east and south to north. As the center and largest home of humanity, our continent is rapidly moving away from its potential due to regional development disparities and some humanitarian crises, and is not where it needs to be in the world. The joint action will be beneficial for transforming Asia's existing richness into prosperity. With cooperation and solidarity, it is possible to reach much higher levels of development more easily. In this framework, it is necessary to build multidimensional and advanced cooperation. Although forging good bilateral relations are

important, they are only sufficient up to a certain point. Multilateral relations are also extremely vital.

The development of multilateral relations will allow for the comprehensive development of economic networks in line with specific objectives. In many areas, such as investment, trade, transportation, etc., it is possible to overcome challenges through mutual efforts. Multilateral international cooperation can also make valuable contributions in numerous other areas. There is a great deal of work to be done in science, education and international conflict resolution.

As direct representatives of the peoples, parliaments can play a leading role in the development of multilateral cooperation. The improvement of relations between countries will gain momentum and rise on a more solid ground with the harmony and solidarity between parliaments. The choosing of the title The Role of Parliaments in Strengthening Multilateral Cooperation for our General Assembly is quite meaningful and accurate. As you may recall, last year, at our 14th General Assembly, also held in Baku, we discussed the very valuable topic of “sustainable development”. It is possible that multilateral international cooperation can be a lever in this field as well. Thus, the continuation of our work with complementary agendas is a fundamental contribution of the Azerbaijani presidency to our Assembly.

Distinguished Participants,

About 60% of the world's population lives in Asia, although Asia represents less than 40% of the world's economic output. Nevertheless, the heart of the world beats in Asia, both as a producer and a consumer. In various respects, Asia contains one-third of the global economic volume, which is quite low relative to the continent's population. However, in terms of natural resources, manpower and trade routes, Asia's weight in the global power equation is increasing. Despite the positive developments, Asia is also the scene of some instability and crises.

Syria has experienced a civil war that lasted more than a decade. During this period, the Syrian people have suffered immensely. Millions of Syrians were forced to flee their homeland. Turkey has always stood by the Syrian people. We have opened our doors to millions of Syrians fleeing the civil war and we continue to host them.

Finally, the oppressive regime in Syria has been removed. Today, it is of utmost importance to support the transition process in Syria and to give all kinds of support to the territorial integrity of Syria. Terrorist organizations such as PKK, YPG, PYD and DAESH cannot have place in Syria. Permanent stability cannot be built in a Syria where these terrorist organizations exist, nor can regional stability be achieved. We see Syria's reconstruction, prosperity and peace as an indispensable issue for our region. In this direction, APA countries provide all kinds of support. We invite all Asian countries to support the newly established government in Syria. I would like to remind that ending the sanctions against Syria is one of the most important steps in this context and sincerely thank all the countries that support peace and stability in Syria.

Dear Members of Parliament,

After 471 days of genocide in Gaza, a temporary ceasefire was reached on January 19 with our efforts. Despite Israel's foot-dragging, the prisoner swaps continue. We are pleased to observe that Hamas remains loyal to its promise. For 15 months, Gaza has been under a heavy blockade and although the aid is not at the desired level, it has started to reach Gaza. However, unfortunately, we see that the Israeli administration has more insidious and inhumane plans in mind instead of making the ceasefire permanent. The proposals put forward by the new American administration under the pressure of the Zionist lobby regarding Gaza are not worthy of consideration and discussion from our point of view. They are utter nonsense and a waste of time. No one has the power to remove Gazans from their eternal homeland of thousands of years. Palestine, with Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem, belongs to the Palestinians. Any plan to separate Gaza from Gazans is null and void.

The prerequisite for peace and stability in the region is the establishment of an independent and sovereign Palestinian state within the 1967 borders, with geographical integrity and with East Jerusalem as its capital. Türkiye, with its parliament, government and people, stands by the Palestinian people and has been working for a peaceful and just solution to this problem from the very beginning on every platform.

Madamme President,

Honorable Members of Parliament,

We welcome the steps taken to enhance the institutional capacity of the APA. In this context, we support the process of amending some articles of the APA Charter and Rules of Procedure in the meetings of the Standing Committee and the Working Group on Basic Documents, but consider it insufficient. We think that both the Charter and the Rules of Procedure of the Assembly would be more useful to be discussed as a whole in a working group meeting consisting of experts rather than politicians. Otherwise, we will make very little progress by changing one or two articles every year.

In conclusion, I would like to thank everyone who contributed to this meeting, especially our esteemed host Azerbaijan. Believing that the Asian Parliamentary Assembly will be the bedrock of multilateral cooperation across Asia in a new and stronger structure, I wish peace and tranquility to prevail in all parts of Asia and the world. I greet you with respect.

Report of the Chairperson of the Executive Council to the Plenary

**Madam President,
Distinguished Delegates,
Dear Colleagues,**

*It is a great pleasure for me, as chairperson of the Executive Council and Representative of the APA President **H.E. Sahiba Gafarova**, the esteemed Speaker of the Milli Majlis of Azerbaijan, to welcome you all to the 15th Plenary Session of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly in Baku, the capital city of the Republic of Azerbaijan.*

It is also an honor for me to present to the 15th APA Plenary the Report of the Executive Council meeting of 18 February 2025 in Baku:

1. Following adoption of the agenda of the Executive Council, the meeting elected members of the Bureau by acclamation as follows:

- Chairman: Azerbaijan
- Vice Chair : Jordan
- Rapporteur : Bhutan

2. In my opening remarks as Chairperson of the Executive council I made the following points:

- *Azerbaijan views the Asian Parliamentary Assembly as a unique platform for promoting Asian solidarity and cooperation across various fields and supports strengthening its organizational capacities.*
- *We are concerned about the situation in the Middle East and therefore we support efforts to reduce tensions in region and find a political solution.*
- *For the first time since decades, de facto peace has been established between Armenia and Azerbaijan, stability has been achieved on the ground.*
- *Despite the various challenges, around 300,000 Azerbaijani refugees displaced from Armenia are still waiting to return to their ancestral homes.*
- *We will continue to support efforts to achieve a just, lasting, and peaceful resolution to all outstanding issues in the greater Asian region in accordance with the fundamental norms and principles of international law.*

3. The APA Secretary General, Dr. Majidi also presented his Report on the APA activities during the 2024/2025. Secretary General in his Report outlined the work of the four Standing Committees and other major events of the APA.

4. I am delighted to report to you that at yesterday's meeting, the Executive Council unanimously approved the application of the Sultanate of Oman for the full membership and the application of the Republic of Belarus for the APA observer status and sought the Plenary endorsement.

5. It is also my honor to report that the Executive Council, noting that the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Kingdom of Bahrain

had generously offered their candidacy for APA Presidency of 2026-2027, approved the following arrangements which have been agreed among them through good offices of APA Secretary General and under the chairmanship of the representative of the APA President:

1. Kingdom of Bahrain will hold the position of APA Presidency for 2026.
2. Islamic Republic of Iran will hold the position of APA Presidency for 2027-2028.
3. Iran as the APA vice-president will host the Standing Committee on Political Affairs in 2025.
4. Iran as the APA vice-president will host the Standing Committee on Economic and Sustainable Development in 2026.
6. The Executive Council at yesterday's meeting, also reconfirmed the nomination of the Kingdom of Bahrain, the State of Qatar and Russia Federation for the three post of APA Vice – Presidency and hosting of the Standing Committees for the 2025 and recommended them to the Plenary for endorsement.

Dear Colleagues,

7. As its main task, the Executive Council considered the draft resolutions adopted by Standing Committees on Social and Cultural Affairs, Budget, and Planning, Economic and Sustainable Development and Political Affairs. After debating several minor changes, all draft resolutions were approved by the Executive Council and recommended to the Plenary for the final approval.
8. The Executive Council considered the report on Working Group on Statutory Documents in Bahrain and Iraq. At these two meetings

Article 5 and 8 of the APA Charter and Rules 15 and 34.1 of the APA Rules of Procedure were reviewed. The text of the reviewed Articles of the APA Charter and Rules of the APA Rules of Procedure were presented by the APA Secretariat to the meeting. The Executive Council considered and approved the proposed amendments and recommended it to the 15th Plenary for the final approval.

8a. The Executive Council welcomed the crucial decision regarding equal payment and equal voting rights, recognize that the APA budget is essential for its effective functioning, and called on all Member States to take the necessary measures to allocate the required funds.

8b. The Executive Council endorsed the Recommendation of the Standing Committee that the Committee on Palestine continue its work as a subcommittee of the Political Standing Committee.

9. The report on the two meetings of the Committee on Palestine in Tehran and Baghdad were presented to the meeting.

10. APA Secretariat also reported on the four sessions of the APA Bureau on the sidelines of the Standing Committee meetings in Moscow, Doha, Manama, and Baghdad.

11. The Executive Council considered and adopt the draft Agenda of the 15th APA Plenary.

Report by the Secretary General on the work of the Organization

**Mr. Chairman,
Esteemed Delegates,
Distinguished Colleagues,**

It is with great pleasure and profound honor that I, as Secretary-General, extend my warmest welcome to all esteemed attendees of the 15th Plenary Session of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly (APA) here in Baku, the magnificent capital of the Republic of Azerbaijan.

I am delighted that this landmark session is being convened under the esteemed leadership of **H.E. Sahiba Gafarova**, the highly respected Speaker of the **Milli Majlis of the Republic of Azerbaijan**.

Under Azerbaijan's guidance, and with the dedicated efforts of the four APA Vice-Presidents Bahrain, Iraq, Qatar, and Russia, we have successfully conducted our Standing Committee meetings, fulfilling the objectives outlined in the 14th APA Plenary Session.

Throughout 2024, the APA has remained steadfast in addressing key regional and global issues. Our first gathering of the year took place in Moscow in September, under the framework of the **Standing Committee on Social and Cultural Affairs**. This meeting facilitated in-depth discussions on a range of vital topics, including cultural diversity, heritage preservation, health equity, anti-corruption measures, the fight against the smuggling of cultural artifacts, drug trafficking, youth and human development, tourism, and interfaith dialogue. A significant contribution from the Russian Federation introduced a timely draft resolution on the pursuit of a "More Just Multipolar World Order Reflecting Cultural and Civilizational Diversity." In light of the increasing impact of social media and artificial intelligence, (AI) I firmly believe we must adopt a proactive approach to addressing these emerging social and cultural challenges.

In addition to our work on social and cultural affairs, 2024 marked significant progress in APA's financial planning. **The Standing Committee on Budget and Planning**, convened in November in Qatar, achieved a major milestone by unanimously adopting the principle of equal assessed contributions, setting the amount at \$22,000 USD. This draft resolution underscores the importance of equitable financial participation by all Member Parliaments, ensuring the sustainable operation of the APA and its Secretariat. I am confident that with the endorsement of this model by the 15th Plenary Session, the APA will take a substantial step toward achieving its noble goals with renewed confidence and shared commitment. On this occasion, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Islamic Parliament of Iran for its continued financial and logistical support to the APA Secretariat since 2007.

In the area of **economic and sustainable development**, the APA remained deeply engaged throughout 2024. Our December meeting in Manama, Bahrain, provided a platform for rich discussions on energy markets, environmental policies, economic growth, poverty eradication, sustainable development goals (SDGs), and water and sanitation issues. Given the significance of these topics, I strongly encourage Member Parliaments to actively contribute proposals in the

form of draft resolutions for consideration at the next Standing Committee meeting.

On the **political front**, while the APA has consistently emphasized critical issues such as good governance, the rule of law, regional cooperation, and multilateralism, the dominant focus of 2024 has been the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. In response to the catastrophic conditions faced by the Palestinian people, the APA established the "**Committee on Palestine**," which convened twice: first in January 2024 in Tehran, Iran, and then in January 2025 in Baghdad, Iraq, alongside the APA Standing Committee on Political Affairs. During these sessions, the Committee reaffirmed the APA's unwavering support for the Palestinian cause and strongly condemned the massacre of civilians and acts of ethnic cleansing in Gaza perpetrated by the Zionist regime.

Between the 14th and 15th Plenary Sessions, we also made significant progress in reviewing and updating the APA's statutory documents. The APA **Working Group on Statutory Documents** convened in Manama, Bahrain, in December 2024, and in Baghdad, Iraq, in January 2025, where it conducted a comprehensive review of Article 5 and Article 8 of the APA Charter, as well as Rule 15 of the APA Rules of Procedure. The Executive Council has since approved these amendments and recommended them for formal endorsement by the Plenary. BAKU DECLARATION,
20 February 2025.

We, Members of Parliaments of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly (APA) who attended the 15th Plenary Session of APA in Baku from 17 February to 21 February 2025, upon the invitation of H.E. Sahiba GAFAROVA, Speaker of the National Assembly of the Republic of Azerbaijan and President of APA:

Representing the Asian nations, which are bound by deeply-rooted ties of history, geography, culture, economy, politics and civilization;

Commending the amity and the friendly relations among the Asian Nations, while recognizing the need to reinforce all kind of international cooperation that is indispensable for realizing the objectives of the APA, i.e., the promotion of freedom, justice, strengthening progress and prosperity of its members and making better use of the region's vast human and natural resources in the interests of the member countries;

Recalling the principles of the Charter of the United Nations in their entirety and interconnection with each other, including those of sovereign equality, political independence and territorial integrity of all States, refraining from use of force or the threat of use of force in international relations and non-interference in the internal affairs of States;

Underlining the absolute value of multilateralism in fostering a more prosperous, peaceful and sustainable world and expressing their determination to promote multilateral cooperation;

Emphasizing the importance of parliamentary diplomacy in maintaining peace, security and stability in the world and in enhancing trust, cooperation and solidarity among nations;

Concerned over the ongoing conflicts, security challenges and the threats of terrorism in parts of Asia and the suffering of people affected by these conflicts, especially displaced people;

Welcoming the announcement of a deal to secure a ceasefire and the release of prisoners and hostages in Gaza and **stressing** the importance of full implementation of the deal, firstly, to ease sufferings caused by the conflict and expand the delivery of sustained humanitarian relief;

Stressing the centrality of promoting the rule of law, justice and good governance for realization of human rights and fundamental freedoms and **underscoring** in this regard the legislative authority of Parliaments;

Promoting tolerance, mutual understanding and respect for core human values by rejecting any form of discrimination, racism, xenophobia or Islamophobia;

Encouraging the importance of the effective inclusion of women and youth in social, cultural, economic and political affairs and decision-making in Asia as appropriate;

Expressing our will to boost regional cooperation in political, economic, commercial, social, environmental, healthcare, cultural and educational fields, including by strengthening inter-parliamentary dialogue in Asia;

Reiterating the significance of achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly in the areas of health, education, housing, food security, nutrition, poverty eradication and environmental sustainability;

Noting that a healthy environment is a prerequisite and key enabler for sustainable development and social welfare, and that the adverse impacts of climate change affect vulnerable countries the most, **highlighting** the need for enhancing the individual and collective capacity of Asian countries to address climate risks;

Noting the successful outcomes of the 29th session of the Conference of Parties (COP29) to United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) held in Baku, Azerbaijan on 11-22 November 2024 that will contribute significantly to addressing environmental and climate related global challenges;

Commending role of parliamentary diplomacy in strengthening multilateral cooperation in Asia and underscoring commitment of the APA Member States to address all aspects of the critical issue of multilateral cooperation.

Acknowledging that effective parliamentary cooperation is essential for providing legislative support to enhance economic collaboration and interconnectivity in Asia;

Hereby:

Reaffirm our commitment to the Charter of the United Nations, the universally recognized norms and principles of international law and to the Charter of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly;

Support the strengthening of multilateralism and **advocate** for more efficient, inclusive and transparent global governance and an order based on international law;

Reject any unlawful political and economic pressure against any Member State, particularly those, whose nations are suffering from the negative consequences of unilateral coercive measures at political, economic and social levels;

Mobilize all efforts to promote peace in Asia through the peaceful resolution of disputes, by providing assistance to conflict affected populations and by encouraging the safe and dignified return of displaced persons;

Recognize the repeated appeals by the Western Azerbaijani Community to engage in dialogue for the return to their ancestral homes in Armenia, as enshrined in various international human rights instruments, and mobilize all efforts to ensure the safe and dignified return of these displaced Azerbaijanis.

Urge all parties to fully comply with international law, including international humanitarian law, and call for withdrawal of Israeli forces from the occupied Palestinian territory;

Request the UN and the international community to substantially scale up the delivery of humanitarian relief to Gaza, to rebuild infrastructure and to rehabilitate the people of Gaza;

Reject categorically any foreign plans/initiatives regarding the future of Palestine and post-war Gaza, which are the absolute rights of the Palestinian people.

Reiterate strong support for the establishment of an independent and sovereign State of Palestine with its capital Al Quds and the right to return as mentioned in the UN General Assembly Resolution 194.

Unite efforts and **enhance** cooperation in a collective fight against terrorism, extremism, separatism, xenophobia, islamophobia, racism, crime in the sphere of ICT, transnational organised crime, trafficking in human being and illicit drug trafficking illicit trafficking in weapons, cultural property and other goods, illegal exploitation and trafficking of natural resources and money-laundering;

Exhort APA Member Parliaments to collaborate and take necessary measures to promote the development of ICT infrastructure through enabling policies, capacity building and building confidence and security in the use of ICTs;

Call upon APA Member Parliaments to promote strong inter-parliamentary cooperation and meaningful engagement of women and youth in their working;

Encourage targeted activities to foster intercultural and interfaith dialogue and exchange in Asia, including through active engagement in Baku Process and Peace4culture Global Campaign;

Encourage enhanced dialogue and cooperation in the areas of culture, sport and tourism among the APA Member Countries;

Underline the importance of fostering economic relations and trade channels to strengthen regional interconnectivity and support regional transport and digital connectivity projects;

Urge Asian governments to improve the implementation of SDG's and to adopt policy approaches to develop a comprehensive and innovative growth strategies needed to sustain a resilient, balanced, sustainable and inclusive economic growth;

Further urge APA Member Parliaments to redouble efforts in supporting activities to eradicate poverty, reduce inequality, ensure food security, access to healthcare and education, including by developing and implementing effective policies;

Invite APA member Parliaments to develop cross-sectoral collaboration for the advancement of health equity in Asia and adopt policies and measures to improve health care services and social protection systems;

Call for improving alternative energy resources, emphasizing the importance of renewable and low-emission energy and energy efficiency in achieving sustainable development and protecting the environment, including through involving investments in infrastructure and the use of environment-friendly, innovative technology;

Invite APA Member Parliaments to proceed with legislation and other legal actions deemed relevant for integrating climate policies into broader development policies and urge their respective governments to implement projects in line with the measures outlined their Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and the Paris Agreement as appropriate;

Note the adoption of the Baku Climate Unity Pact at the 29th session of the Conference of the Parties to the UNFCCC in November 2024 and **commend** the COP29 Presidency's global initiatives aimed at enabling impactful climate action;

Acclaim with great satisfaction the expansion of the ranks of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly and welcome the full membership of the Sultanate of Oman, as well as the granting of Observer status to the Republic of Belarus.

Support the crucial decision by the Plenary of the APA regarding equal payment and equal voting rights, recognize that the APA budget is essential for its effective functioning and a critical concern for all Member States, and call on all Member States to take the necessary measures to allocate the required funds.

Welcome the unanimous endorsement of the Kingdom of Bahrain for the 2026 term and the Islamic Republic of Iran for the 2027-2028 term as the APA President, and **emphasize** the significance of this momentous occasion in the historic city of Baku, reflecting confidence in their ability to advance the noble objectives of the APA through effective parliamentary diplomacy.

Express gratitude to Azerbaijan for its warm, gracious and efficient hospitality in hosting the Fifteenth Plenary session of the APA in Baku.

Dear Secretary General, Dr. Majidi,

Russian Delegation to the Asian Parliamentary Assembly 15th Plenary Session in Azerbaijan would like to draw your attention and the attention of all the APA Member Parliaments to the Russian position on the adoption of the Baku Declaration.

Drafting of the APA Baku Declaration on 20 February 2025 resulted in violations of the principles stipulated in the APA Statutory Documents.

In accordance with the APA Rules of Procedure (Rule 21), the Plenary shall promote friendly and constructive dialogue. To this end, bilateral contentious issues shall be excluded. However, an issue of bilateral contentious nature was included into the Baku Declaration by the Drafting Committee despite the concerns and point of order raised by Russian delegation. Our comments concerning the issue of displaced persons voiced before acclamation were completely disregarded by the host country. Therefore, Russian delegation would like to officially inform the APA Secretariat about the formal letter sent to the Head of Azerbaijani Delegation as the APA Chair, which reads:

“Russian Parliamentary delegation to the 15th Plenary Session of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly adheres to the position that in accordance with the APA existing practices, the Plenary Session Declaration is a document to be endorsed by consensus. Therefore, we call upon the Republic of Azerbaijan, as the APA Chair, to give due consideration to the positions expressed by national delegations and avoid including into Plenary Session Declaration any paragraphs that were not approved by all the APA Member Parliaments.

Any other text may be issued by the Chair as a separate Chair Statement, not requiring consensus of all the APA Member Parliaments present at the session.”

However, the Russian position was not reflected in the Final Draft of the Baku Declaration that we received from the host country. Thus, the following wording was proposed by the Russian delegation in order to reach consensus:

Recognize the necessity to address the outstanding humanitarian issues within the framework of the reconciliation process between Azerbaijan and Armenia, including return of refugees and preservation of cultural and religious heritage. ~~[the repeated appeals by the Western Azerbaijani Community to engage in dialogue for the return to their ancestral homes in Armenia, as enshrined in various international human rights instruments, and mobilize all efforts to ensure the safe and dignified return of these displaced Azerbaijanis.]~~

Regrettably, Russian delegation's proposals were not included into the text. With that in mind, to maintain the APA high status and image we kindly ask the Secretariat to draw the APA Member Parliaments' attention to the incident and distribute the information about the situation among them.

On top of that, we request the Secretariat to approach Azerbaijani Parliament with a view to amend or delete the afore-mentioned paragraph.

We would also like to reserve the right of Russian delegation to get back to this issue so that our position is duly reflected in the final documents.

We expect the APA Member Parliaments and the Secretariat to take all the necessary measures to avoid such unacceptable situations in future.

Separate Opinion of the Russian Delegation on the APA Draft Resolution on Asian Parliaments' Unwavering Support for the Palestinian People

(Baghdad, January 11-12, 2025)

The Russian delegation to the Asian Parliamentary Assembly wishes to express its respect for the delegations of all member countries of the Assembly and would like to voice the following regarding the Draft Resolution on Asian Parliaments' Unwavering Support for the Palestinian People.

We extend our heartfelt condolences to the families and friends of those who have lost their lives as a result of armed confrontations and empathies with all those who have suffered. We hope that humanitarian situation in the crisis zone will recover. Any violence against civilians is unacceptable, including strikes against civilian infrastructure, medical facilities, and places where the elderly, women, and children gather.

Russia's position on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict and the pathways towards establishing lasting peace in the region is well-known and consistent. It is essential, above all, to achieve an immediate and comprehensive ceasefire, as well as a humanitarian truce to provide assistance to all those in need. We endorse the core mandate of UNRWA as a unique agency for aiding Palestinians. We acknowledge the importance of de-escalating hostilities and renouncing violence.

We advocate for the full resumption of the political and diplomatic process aimed at achieving a long-term and fair settlement to the inveterate Middle Eastern conflict following internationally recognized legal principles, including, in particular, the UN Security Council resolutions. The ultimate outcome of this process should be the establishment of an independent Palestinian state within the 1967 borders, with East Jerusalem as its capital, coexisting in peace and security with Israel. It is the only approach that will help achieve a sustainable solution and break the vicious circle of bloodshed.

We welcome the UN General Assembly Resolution on the admission of Palestine as a full member to the United Nations adopted in May 2024 by the overwhelming majority.

Hence, the Russian delegation, while generally supporting the spirit of the APA Draft

Resolution on Asian Parliaments' Unwavering Support for the Palestinian People, deems it necessary to use the terminology and wordings enshrined in the resolutions of the UN Security Council and General Assembly that correspond to the high level of activity of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly.

We are convinced of the need to further enhance inter-parliamentary cooperation at the Asian Parliamentary Assembly to put an end to the suffering of the people of Gaza and to promote the use of peaceful political and diplomatic means that lead toward a comprehensive resolution of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict and, more broadly, the Middle Eastern conflict, whose escalation has brought destabilization to the entire region.

Decision

The 15th APA Plenary on 20 February 2025 endorsed the outcome of the consultation of the Executive Council on the future APA Presidency.

Noting that the Islamic Republic of Iran and the Kingdom of Bahrain had generously offered their candidacy for APA Presidency of 2026-2027.

The Assembly, in accordance with the agreement reached under the chairmanship of the representative of the APA president, decides to adopt the following arrangements as agreed:

1. Kingdom of Bahrain will hold the position of APA Presidency for 2026.
2. Islamic Republic of Iran will hold the position of APA Presidency for 2027-2028.
3. Iran as the APA vice-president will host the Standing Committee on Economic and Sustainable Development in 2026.

Amendments to the APA Charter

Article 8: Number of Votes

In the Plenary, each member parliament shall have one vote and has two delegates plus additional delegates determined as follows:

- Countries with population between 1 million up to 50 million will have two additional delegates,
- Countries with population between 50 and 200 million will have three additional delegates,
- Countries with population between 200 and 500 million will have four additional delegates, and
- Countries with population over 500 million will have five additional delegates,

Article 5: Basic Organs and Structures:

A: Basic APA Organs:

The APA shall be composed of the Plenary, the Executive Council, the Bureau of Assembly, the Standing Committees and the Secretariat.

Activities of the APA Organs and establishment of subsidiary bodies shall be regulated by the APA Rules of Procedure.

B: Organizational Structure of the APA:

The organization of the hierarchy structure shall be arranged in a democratic manner indicating clearly the specific composition, function, powers and Rules of Procedure to reach balance, harmony and effectiveness of the APA work, as an institution, all, shall be subject to the approval of the Plenary.

Amendments to the APA Rules of Procedure

IV: Standing Committees and Sub-Committees:

Rule 15:

1. The Plenary may set up Standing Committees and Sub-Committees as it deems necessary to deal with any subject of interest and to examine the issues on its agenda. These bodies shall submit as appropriate their draft resolutions, reports and recommendations to the Plenary for its consideration and decision.
2. The APA shall have four Standing Committees on: Political Affairs, Economic and Sustainable Development, Social and Cultural Affairs, Budget and Planning. Decisions of the Standing Committees shall be taken by consensus. Any other issues of interest are to be considered within the scope of sub-committees under direct supervision of the relevant Standing Committee
3. Upon suggestion of the Bureau or at least ten Member Parliaments, establishment of Sub-Committees, shall be put on the agenda of the Executive Council for its approval. The recommendation of the Executive Council on this issue shall be approved by the majority votes of the delegates present and voting in the Plenary.

Rule 34:

Each member parliament shall have one vote.
